As we receive more inquiries and requests for partnerships and collaboration, the board decided to formally change our name, to clearly indicate the mission of FIVE. The Five Project for International Autism and Disability Support, Inc. retains the important "FIVE", which was chosen because "5" is a favorite thing of the young woman with autism who inspired us to begin our work in autism in China. In the last few months, FIVE has provided training, responded to requests for videos and training, and welcomed new families to our monthly support group in Nanjing, China. All of our work directly serves families and teachers of children and adults with disabilities, and we are grateful to supporters and volunteers! Praise for FIVE's Innovative Training Model: Dalian Training



In March, three FIVE team members went to Dalian to provide hands-on teacher training at Little Dolphins Autism Rehabilitation Center, and ChunYu Preschool (which serves children with and without disabilities). Our onsite training involving in-class guidance and immediate feedback and practice opportunities was repeatedly praised by the teachers and organizational leaders as being innovative and unique. One leader noted, *"We have never had such a useful and practical training like this before, where the teachers immediately practice what they learn."* All

of the teachers were excited about using their new skills, and FIVE trainers and translators (Patricia Wright, Helen McCabe, and Karen McCabe) were extremely impressed with the solid foundation and the rapid improvement of the teachers. FIVE was also able to provide two informational sessions to families who are part of the Dalian Region Parents Association (a regional branch of the Beijing Association for the Rehabilitation of Children with Autism) in the evenings. It was an extremely busy 8 days in Dalian, but the excellent results mean more effective instruction for the children, thus making the hard work worth it!! We thank all of the staff, as well as Professor Yu from Liaoning Normal University, who accompanied us almost the entire time and was a great bridge to her students and others who could not be there. All organizations are eager for FIVE trainers to return for follow up training, which we hope to do within the next 8-12 months.

Awareness & Advocacy in the US and China

The Five Project for International Autism and Disability Support, in addition to providing practical training and materials to teachers and families in need, also is active in promoting awareness about disability in China, advocating through action for better services and inclusion. In February FIVE collaborated with REEL Abilities: Boston Disabilities Film Festival to host a showing of "Son of the Stars", a fictional account of the efforts and experiences of a young boy with autism and his mother. FIVE Co -founder Helen McCabe led a discussion with the almost 100 audience members after the film, and through this was able to educate and make viewers aware of the challenges for families of individuals with autism in China. Through this event, FIVE was invited to join the Global Partnership on Children with Disabilities, and Helen will represent FIVE as she helps lead an

early childhood task team to promote a similar partnership in China. Another activity that has allowed us to promote awareness and advocacy in society was our training in March at a preschool that serves children with and without disabilities in Dalian. Local media publicized this training, drawing attention to the importance of providing inclusive education for all children. In July, cofounder Helen McCabe will speak to American college students at "Princeton in Beijing" about autism and disability in China. This is an opportunity to educate almost 200 students and their Chinese faculty, and promote understanding about needs of individuals with disabilities & their families in China. This is especially meaningful as Helen worked at "PIB" in 1995-6, while also volunteering with children with autism. Students will gain a vision of the way they too might add service and advocacy into their time in China.

"From this training, we now more fully understand the supports needed for children with autism, and will use what we learned to better provide inclusive education for children with autism." (Teacher at ChunYu)

Ongoing Projects: Support Group and Videos

The FIVE Mutual Support and Activity Family Group continues to meet monthly in Nanjing. Group members are constantly reminding us how valuable they have found the chance to be with families just like them. One father shared that before joining this group, he, his wife and son were very isolated. They never felt comfortable going out, whether to a park or a restaurant. Now, they eagerly look forward to the monthly gatherings, and often get together informally with other group members as well. Friendships have formed among the young adults with disabilities as well as among the parents.

Also ongoing is the creation of videos to teach parents and teachers about autism and related

teaching strategies. Our local support group leaders, Wu Suxing and Zhang Guojun, have also taken on the responsibility of distributing videos within China to families and teachers who request them. We often receive notes of thanks, and some families even call Wu and Zhang to thank them personally. The videos are both providing training and information, and also bringing people together!

Recently, after sending videos to parents in dozens of locations in China, one wrote and said, "Thank you so much. Your videos are so practical and clear. It is hard to get useful information in China. I look forward to more materials from The Five Project, and really need your help."
